The Norwegian Labor Market

The Norwegian labor market is formed by the working model. This means being an organised labor market with regulations and laws that create rights and obligations for all parts in the working model. There is a cooperation between employers and employees, trade unions, employees associations and the government. This is what we call "Trapartite cooperation" and "co-determination" in the working model. The hierarchy is more low than high with short distance and dialogue between employers and employees. Representatives from associations have the right to be involved with contributing in the decision-making processes involving employees working conditions and benefits, and working with trade unions. There is a mutual respect which creates trust between the different parts in the Norwegian labor market.

- Social welfare

How to get a job

Tips and advice about how you can get a job in Norway.

- 1. Collect your documents from your educational background and work experiences. Documents could be diplomas, transcripts and certificates, and work experiences should be confirmations and letters of recommandations. Remember to have it all translated into Norwegian or English by an approved translator.
- 2. CV (Curriculum Vitae) is more important than a Cover Letter. The CV should not be longer than 2 pages but should be between 1 to 2 pages short. The purpose of the CV is to tell about yourself through descriptions of information about yourself, educational background with diplomas and transcripts, work experiences with skills and certificates, and other skills such as languages and driving courses. Add 2-3 references with personal contact information to them.
- 3. Contact the employer directly if you want the vacant job position listed while you send your CV and letter. Keep in mind that the letter should not be longer than one page but not shorter than half a page. It should give a short presentation of yourself with a short summary about why you would fit for this job and why you want this job!
